Child Protection Summit 2021

Finishing Children's Care Coordination Plans

The Managing Entities are at the final stage of their timeline in developing children's care coordination plans. Managing Entities meet monthly, sometimes weekly, to finalize HB 945 plans due on December 31, 2021. Managing Entities are completing community meetings with stakeholders and securing MOUs or "other signed documents" from boards and/or county stakeholders. Stakeholders who have been invited to participate include but not limited to: Baker Act facilities for minors, county and local government officials, law enforcement, school districts, CBC's, SEDNET representatives, DCF, APD, AHCA, manage care plans, early learning coalition, behavioral health providers, Managing Entity boards of directors, continuum of care steering committees, behavioral health workgroups, wrap-around service providers, and the children's care coordination team.

The Managing Entities are currently completing a list of "opportunities" for improvement that will be included in final plans.



State Representative David Silvers was the sponsor of HB 945 (2020) which required the Managing Entities to plan a coordinated system of care for children throughout the state.

2022 Bills to Watch

Senate Bill 312, Telehealth by Sen. Diaz

The bill revises the definition of the term telehealth to allow for audio-only services and prohibits schedule II substances from being prescribed via telehealth. *Similar bill: HB 17 Telehealth by Rep. Fabricio*

HB 129, Insurance Coverage for Athome COVID-19 Test Kits by Rep.

Zika Requires health insurers & health maintenance organizations to provide 100 percent coverage for at-home COVID-19 test kits.

Identical bill: SB 328 Insurance Coverage for At-home COVID-19 Test Kits by Sen .A. Rodriguez

HB 193, Using Alternative Therapies to Treat Mental Health and other Medical Conditions by Rep. Grieco Requires DOH, in collaboration with the Board of Medicine, to conduct a study regarding the use of alternative therapies such as MDMA, psilocybin, and ketamine in the treatment of mental health and other medical conditions; requires DOH to submit written report to Governor and Legislature. *Similar bill: SB 348 Using Alternative Therapies to Treat Mental Health and Other Medical Conditions by Sen. Book*

SB 218, Defendants with a Traumatic Brain Injury by Sen Farmer Redefines the term "intellectual disability" as it relates to defendants who have been found to be incompetent to proceed by adding the terms "significantly deficient in adaptive functioning" and "traumatic brain injury"; requiring the Agency for Persons with Disabilities to assist certain defendants found incompetent to proceed with the application to the long-term care managed care program.

SB 282, Mental Health and Substance Use Disorders by Sen. Rouson This bill specifies the importance of peer specialists



HB 95, Controlled Substance Offenses by Rep. Plakon Revises elements that constitute capital offense of murder in the first degree to include drug overdoses. It also prohibits delivering, selling, or manufacturing a controlled substance within 1,000 feet of a substance use or mental health facility. Doing so would be committing a first-degree felony. *Identical bill: SB 190 Controlled Substances by Sen. Brodeur*

HB 195, Juvenile Diversion Program Expunction by Rep. David

Smith Requires FDLE to expunge nonjudicial arrest records of certain minors who successfully complete diversion programs for misdemeanor offenses and nonviolent felonies. This program authorizes minors who successfully complete diversion programs for any offense, rather than only for first-time misdemeanor offenses. *Identical bill: SB 342 Juvenile Diversion Program Expunction by Sen. Perry*

SB 252, Health Care Cost Savings by Sen. Brodeur Revising the definition of the term "shoppable health care service" to mean a lower-cost, high-quality nonemergency health care service for which a shared savings incentive is available for insureds under a shared savings incentive program. Services provided among other things, including services provided through telehealth.

SB 296, Health Care Expenses by Sen.

in a coordinated system of care in recovery from a substance use disorder or mental illness. The bill requires DCF to develop a training program for peer specialists and gives preference to trainers who are certified peer specialists.

SB 330, Medicaid Modernization by Sen. Brodeur Authorizes Medicaid to reimburse providers for certain remote evaluation and patient monitoring services. **Garcia** Requires a licensed facility to establish, update, and make public a list of the facility's charges for services that meet certain federal requirements. This bill also prohibits consumer reporting agencies from publishing a consumer report containing a medical debt credit impairment under certain circumstances.

Eyes on Capitol Hill

In Washington DC, we are monitoring a few major pieces of behavioral health legislation. These bills have only been introduced and we will monitor their movements through Capitol Hill.
